Digging a little deeper:

Jacob was the unloved son, Leah was the unloved wife and yet their son Judah would be the bloodline Jesus was born into. This reflects the true nature of Salvation. The rescuer (Jesus) came to help the imperfect. We are rescued by Grace not because of a deserving family history or all the good we've done. Jesus looks past the things others see as too ugly or too messy and saves us by grace.
